Collections and Programming (CAP) Grants

Collections and Programming (CAP) grants provide \$4,000 each to help libraries expand their collections for target audiences and increase access to those collections through programming. By increasing their collections and providing equitable, diverse, and inclusive resources, libraries are better equipped to serve the needs of underserved groups including at-risk children, the aging population, those facing barriers to library access, and other targeted LSTA priority groups.

Staff Development Day Grants

Staff Development Day grants award \$3,000 each to help libraries across the state deliver topquality training for staff that are unable to attend other training opportunities offered by the State Library due to time, staff, or budget limitations. Wi-Fi Hotspot Lending Grants

Wi-Fi Hotspot Lending grants award \$4,000 each to help libraries close the digital divide between those with and without Internet access in their communities. Libraries will use the funds to purchase hotspot devices with cell-phone data plans to lend out to community members who can then access the Internet through the device's Wi-Fi.

The goal of this project is to improve pronunciation. Funds will be used to contract qualified speech therapists. Community members will benefit because children will strengthen the muscles used in speech and will learn to speak correctly.

Preparing Photographic Collections for Cold Storage

Project Summary

The goal of this project is to locate, stabilize, digitize, describe, and package photographic collections so they are ready for long-term preservation in the new cold-storage preservation environment being built at the Arizona State Museum. Many nitrate negatives are interspersed throughout the photographic collection, this format is at high risk for obsolescence and these items need to be located, assessed for stability, scanned, and then have their locations updated in the collection management system. Funds will be used to pay one part-time staff person to complete the work. Community members will benefit because these photographic materials are among the earliest and most utilized images of Native American peoples in the Southwest.

This program will be beneficial to the community because it will offer a much-needed structured after-school experience that is currently not available in the school district.

Community members will benefit because they will have an opportunity to gain a deeper understanding and appreciation of Indigenous American culture, fostering cultural sensitivity and promoting inclusivity. The programs will offer insight into traditions, music, and art, encouraging a sense of shared heritage. Addressing contemporary issues will enhance awareness and dialogue, promoting a more informed and engaged community.

Homing In on Information Literacy at Holmes

Funds will be used to purchase a set of Chromebooks for the library, allowing us to incorporate technology into library lessons, and to purchase non-fiction materials for the library collection that will support student research and learning. Community members will benefit because students will develop the strong base they need to continue through school and life as informed, intelligent, and successful individuals.

Community members will benefit because the project addresses a critical need for accessible early literacy resources, empowering parents and caregivers as active participants in their child's literacy journey. By providing engaging kits and expanding early literacy programming, the project aims to contribute to increased literacy proficiency among young children, ultimately fostering a community where literacy is prioritized, accessible, and shared among families.

The goal of this project is to build and maintain an adaptive technology workstation at each branch to ensure a user living with disabilities has access to informational resources regarding employment prospects, lifelong learning opportunities or research in health, wellness, or livability issues. The funds will be used to purchase adaptive equipment and appropriate assistive software to address the library system's current transition to offer more inclusive equipment for persons with disabilities. Community members will benefit as the adaptive equipment will address specific ADA physical space recommendations to secure equal access to library resources. The Library System wants to ensure inclusivity for which public libraries are famous, and this grant will help us address this transition swiftly.

Serving Patrons' Psychosocial Needs in the Library

The goal of this project is to increase teen engagement through changes to the collection and the addition of corresponding Teen Time programming for Prescott teens between the ages of 12-18. Funds will be used to update shelving and furniture in our existing Teen Zone to facilitate the growth of targeted collections in high-interest areas and create a flexible space to increase complementary teen programming. Community members will benefit because the Teen Zone at Prescott Public Library provides a valuable community third space option for teens which will become more aesthetically pleasing, safe, and teen focused. Drawing and engaging new and continuing teen use of the library will provide inclusive opportunities for informal education, continued literacy connection, and growth.

The allocated funds will be utilized to employ a part-time Community Resource Specialist responsible for facilitating connections and aiding community members in accessing necessary social and other services. Furthermore, resources will be allocated to train and mentor library staff to proficiently deliver these services. Community members will benefit by having an experienced social services staff person available to assist community members in a safe and private space.

Community members will benefit by having an opportunity to participate in a variety of free, engaging, convenient, and interactive wellness-based programs centered on health and longevity; to learn methods and practices, and acquire tools and resources, for improving health and vitality, and to increase their social activity and community connections and relationships.

Project Summary

The goal of this project is to provide equitable access to justice by enhancing access to legal information and overcoming geographic barriers within our expansive county. Funds will be used to purchase and promote a Thomson Reuters 12-month pilot project, called Westlaw Patron Access Pro Se, that provides public access to content held in a premier legal research database at any time, from anywhere in Pima County. Funds will also provide Westlaw training for the personnel of our partnering agencies, and training materials specific to pro se litigants. Community members will benefit because they will have free, convenient 24/7 access to this content, gain legal literacy skills, and be empowered to make informed legal decisions irrespective of their location.

Wildcats Memory Lab

Project Summary

The goal of this project is to explore a pilot program for the Wildcats Memory Lab, cultivating digital preservation and experiential learning opportunities. Funds will be used to create a dedicated lab space equipped with digitization tools and instructional resources, as well as workshops focused on personal preservation topics. Community members will benefit by gaining access to resources for preserving personal and historical digital materials, enhancing digital literacy while preserving memories, and facilitating interdisciplinary collaboration with the university campus community.

NOW - Navigation for the Online World

The goal of this project is to help patrons of Yavapai County with digital navigation as well as bring telehealth to their rural communities. Community members will benefit because they will receive help navigating online resources for healthcare, patents, and other topics; as well as have access to medical care directly in their community, without having to travel hours to see a medical provider.

Community members will benefit because they will have library services brought to their doorstep and see how those services can enrich their lives.
