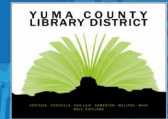


# Federal Funding for Libraries in Arizona CD7

# LSTA & ARPA Across Arizona

The Arizona State Library, a division of the Secretary of State, received \$10,770,125.00 in federal funds from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) during FFYs 2021 and 2022.

**About 25% of the funds were awarded as 194 subgrants to 103 library systems.** These subgrants allow libraries of all types across the state to apply federal funding to their unique community situations.

The funds were used to provide services such as **lending hotspots** to community members without home internet; **teaching digital skills** to people of all ages; and offering **workforce development** resources.

The remaining funds were used for statewide projects including:

- Purchasing electronic resources, including ebooks and ezines;
- Setting up two-person privacy rooms for teleservices;
- Hiring Digital Navigators to assist with basic computer skills training, technology troubleshooting, and online information needs; and
- Distributing STEM kits to enhance informal learning for children.
